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SCHOOL CLIMATE AND CULTURE: THE OTHER DIMENSION

Assessment of school quality is frequently made in terms such as test score trends, enrollment growth, and graduation percentages. These results are typically attributed to factors like adequate funding, teacher training, or average class size. However, these pieces of the school puzzle do not represent the entire picture.

The most important resource the school has for dealing with these vital issues is the level of performance of all people connected with the school (administrators, teachers, parents, and students). The effort and productivity of this school community requires a high level of morale which is strongly linked to what is known as the school's "Climate".

CLIMATE

School Climate can be described as the "atmosphere" or "tone" sensed by someone in a school setting. It may be called something like "ambiance", "mood", or "vibe". We use such words as "friendly", "happy", "inviting", "tense", "hostile", or "depressing" to explain it.

The Climate can be more rigorously defined as the aggregate emotional and psychological response of a group of people to some set of characteristics of the school environment. How the participants perceive the climate will determine their attitude toward the school.

The list of items that can constitute climate is lengthy and varied. Any number of things from the intellectual depth of the curriculum to the color of paint on the walls can elicit positive, negative, or neutral feelings. Given this bewildering array of possible components of climate, how can we recognize which ones can be utilized to modify perception of the climate?

A good place to start is with some fairly well-known areas of school life whose presence or absence on the scene evokes strong feelings from students, staff, and visitors. Here are just a few obvious examples:

- o Stimulating, orderly, and engaging classroom experience
- o Availability and quality of individual instruction
- o High expectation for excellent performance at all levels
- o Clear opportunity for advancement, growth, and recognition by all involved
- o Fair and respectful treatment of students, teachers, and staff.
- o Challenging and relevant curriculum

While this short list is by no means complete, it is intended to exemplify the type of important, but difficult to quantify issues that affect the group spirit. And don't forget that the seemingly small and simple things such as decoration of hallways (or lack of it), telephone courtesy, drinking fountains that work, or fresh flowers at the reception desk also contribute to climate. No single one of them makes a huge difference, but taken all together, they can create lasting impressions.

The point is to be mindful of climatic consequences when generating policies and procedures. Once a climate-improving outcome is identified, it is in most cases easy and cheap to apply. It's the thought that counts. This is especially true of the small items. The trick is to recognize them.

CULTURE

Any discussion of school climate must necessarily include a consideration of the school's culture. The culture of an organization is comprised of a set of beliefs, priorities, practices, expectations, and behaviors that has developed and evolved over time. It is the product of the collective values, goals, and experiences of all the people participating in it.

Because the culture affects so many segments of school life that impinge on the school's climate, the climate tends to act as a short term manifestation of the school culture, ultimately representing the values and priorities of that culture. A positive and healthy culture will produce a positive and healthy climate. A weak, misdirected, or undernourished culture will invariably produce a negative and unpleasant climate.

Title: Nike Employee Grant Fund

The Nike Employee Grant Fund was established at The Oregon Community Foundation in 2010. Through this fund, Nike employees will work with OCF to award \$500,000 per year to local nonprofits.

This is Nike's "backyard" program, engaging employees in aiding nonprofits in communities where local Nike employees live – Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington and Yamhill counties in Oregon and Clark County in Washington. Grants will be one-year awards, generally between \$5,000 and \$20,000.

Most grants will be awarded through the lens of sport, for projects that use sport or physical activity to leverage other community benefits, but some grants will be awarded for projects that address broader family and children's issues.

Eligibility: nonprofits in Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington, and Yamhill counties in Oregon, and Clark County in Washington.

Award: between \$5,000 and \$20,000.

Deadline: June 1, 2013. (twice yearly, June 1 and December 1).

Pioneer Drama Service is proud to offer Touching Lives Through Theatre™ Grants available for the upcoming 2013-14 school year. Because we believe so strongly in the power of theatre to make a difference in a student's life, we are awarding a total of \$5000 of grants in the form of Pioneer Drama credit to qualifying middle and high schools.

Our goal with these grants is to create and support school theatre programs, generating positive opportunities for students and giving them a place to shine. Theatre allows children to involve themselves in an experience that brings growth, maturity, teamwork and responsibility—qualities that are relevant to all aspects of life. A 2010 applicant summed this up quite eloquently:

"The theatre program at my school is one of the most important and beneficial aspects of the school... Students enter the stage apprehensive and shy and leave the stage with confidence, poise and grace. Whether students are destined for Broadway or the corporate world, no doubt about it, theatre has a positive influence on their lives."

Each grant is intended to help create a complete drama experience for students in a school and must be used to stage at least one theatrical production. Grants will range from \$100 to \$500 of credit at Pioneer Drama Service, which is to be used for production materials, royalty fees, texts, DVDs and makeup. Grant funds will be awarded by August 15, 2013 and must be spent in their entirety by June 15, 2014

Eligibility: accredited public or private schools that have a designated faculty member who sponsors their theatre program. Theatre programs must have a budget of \$500 or less annually. Schools with no prior drama program are also eligible.

Award: \$100-500 credit at Pioneer Drama Service.

Deadline: Applications accepted April 1-June 30, 2013.

Title: RGK Foundation Grants

RGK Foundation will entertain one electronic Letter of Inquiry (LOI) per organization in a twelve-month period. The Foundation will send an e-mail message either declining your request or inviting you to submit a formal application packet for further consideration.
